James "Jim" Brown and The Railroad

Jim knew the tracks like a doctor
knew the human body.

The Mobile and Ohio Train ran from
New Orleans to St. Louis, Jim worked
from West Point, Mississippi up to
Illinois. All the engineers knew him.

His hand car was equipped with
tools and if he discovered any
defects it was repaired, the crew made repairs

The rails were put together with
big nails  the cross ties were
made of oak and other hard
wood and dipped in tar and
oil to preserve it. If one was
split or too many knots it was
not used. After the tracks were
laid crushed rocks were put all
around to stabilize the track.

The tracks had to be strong and
had to be kept in good repair, and

Jim Brown's Sister

Josie was born in West Point, Mississippi but moved to Kenton Tenn. with her brother Jim Brown she attended Kenton Public School and married George Beard in Hickman Kentucky and moved to New Madrid Mo. with her husband as his relatives lived there, Uncle Jim wasn't pleased because she slipped off but George was a good worker and made her a good living. They were very nice to Uncle Jim's children and to us as they had no children.

William visited Aunt Josie quite often during the summer. Sometimes we were there also. He was Aunt Josie's favorite she loved him dearly. Her husband called her "Dinah" and that's what William called her. William smoked a pipe when he was quite young but was always neat and clean. He rode the mobile and Ohio trains on passes that Uncle Jim would get for us. George died in Cairo Ill. Josie died in St. Louis, Mo. in 1911.

Relatives of Kizzie Brown

Sister Ruth ~~Pravell~~ ^{Don't know family name,} disappeared in the early 20's in Fort Smith, Ark. Uncle Jim tried for a long time to locate her but finally concluded that she had crossed over.

She had 3 sons Jack Pravell who had a Cafe in St. Louis, he had 1 daughter Marjorie Pravell both are deceased.

William served in the U.S. Army in
World War II he was married and has
one son James who lives in East Chicago,
Ind. Uncle Jim worked until he was
in his seventies he had his own
handcar and rode up and down the
tracks to inspect. He used to ride
from Cache to Nevada on the freight
train in the caboose Aunt Ada
would go over to visit Aunt Julia and
do her shopping she always carried
a basket to put her groceries in.
Uncle Jim wasn't a member of any
church but read his Bible and lived
by it, he loved his wife, children
his sisters and all of us, he helped
to feed and clothe us all, he
always gave my mother money any
time she visited him he called her
Seph and she called him B. Jim
and Aunt Ada Sis Ada. We all
loved Uncle Jim and all his family.

 Japer, Lennie preceded her in death
 and was buried in Eldorado, Ark,
 Robert Russell graduated from
 Wilberforce U. and taught in
 the Western States he later moved
 to California and had a funeral
 service his own business he
 died suddenly ^{in the 50's} and willed his home
 and everything to Arthur Brown
 second son of James Brown Jr. ^{Jim}
 he had two sons James Jr. Brown
 and was married to Melba Brown
 Jim died in the early 70's in a hospital
 in Gallilee, Tenn. Arthur went and
 buried him in Gallilee, Dewey Brown
 died in the late 30's he was married
 to Dovie Brown no children,
 Leroy the baby son died in the 70's
 before Floyd, William is the only
 living one. Jim purchased a home
 in Tammes, Ill. and enough space
 for a child to build a house

Street he had 8 children 4 were born
in Kenton later he was transferred
to Cache, Del. and lived in the Rail-
road homes, later he was transferred
to Tamms Del. where he lived until
his death in the 40's

Jim's wife name was Ada Brown
a very good cook and housekeeper
Jim Brown was an excellent Provider
for his family. Ada died in 1927
during the flood. Jim lived in
Tamms with his children the older
two Jim and Adey left home to
work on a boat from Memphis
Tenn. to New Orleans, Ruth the
oldest daughter married Frank
Summers and lived in Tamms for
a while, she had 4 children Lucille
Fred Archie and Ada Sell "we call
her 'tatoes." (Smiles) Ruth died in Kankakee, Del.

Annie Sell married Theopolis James
and had one son Theopolis Jr. or
"Poney". Annie Sell died in Evanston, Del.

Robert Brown - Shared the horses
took care of all the animals
when they were sick or had
their young, he would be making
money today but that was just
one of his chores. He also milked the
cows and churned the butter.

Kizzie Brown cooked, washed, ironed,
sewed, knitted, crocheted and kept
the house and yards cleaned.
Also was baby sitter for all
the children.

Uncle Jim heard from the family
that owned his parents, they
did not give them any property
after they were freed.
