"FRANKIE" SUES PICTURE COMPANY FOR \$200,000

ST. LOUIS, April 28. (ANP)—Suit for \$200,000 damages was filed by Atty. Joseph L. McLemore in circuit court Thursday for Frankie Baker, of Portland, Ore., who says she is the original "Frankie and Johnnie," against a Hollywood film company and several stars who appeared in the picture of that name.

Defendants listed were Helen Morgan, Lilyan Tashman (now deceased), and Chester Morris actors; Jack Kirkland, author; Chester Erskine, director; Republic Pictures, Inc., and two of its distribution companies.

McLemore said the suit was filed in St. Louis because the story made famous in song occurred there. It charges the picture is a portrayal of incidents in Frankie's life and "was wrongful, wanton, willful, and malicious." The film showed a barroom scene for the 1899 shooting in which Frankie "pulled out her little 44" in her home, then in St. Louis.

According to the attorney, Frankie was subsequently acquitted on grounds of self-defense. In the petition, Frankie said she did not take the life "of said Johnnie because of any engagement concerning Nellie Bly."

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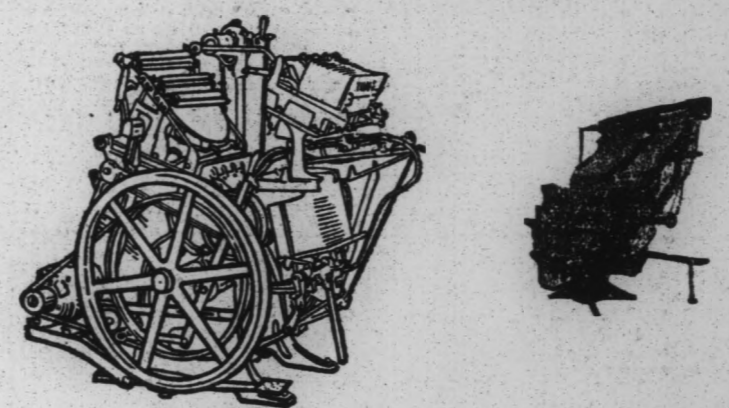
A Mayor's convention later in the year for Mayors from all over the country to meet at some city and discuss plans for the betterment of the Negro in general.
