organization he headed. "We shall continue to use all the tools of the American system, such as the courts, political action, publicity and education," he asserted, "in reaching our objective of making the Negro a first class citizen."

Born in St. Louis, he was reared in St. Paul, Minn., and was graduated from the University of Minnesota where he majored in journalism, economics, and sociology.

HE WAS MANAGING editor of the Kansas City (Mo.) Call from 1923 to 1931 when he joined the NAACP national staff as assistant executive secretary under White.

Aggressive, diplomatic, yet forthright and straight-shooting, Wilkins has achieved a merited recognition in his own right as a formidable and devastating foe of racial segregation, discrimination and second class citizenship for America's minority groups.

Well known and admired in civic and political circles, he is credited with giving invaluable assistance in directing and planning the NAACP's unrelenting campaign against racial injustice in America.

ent lawsuits in as many school districts.

Texas Attorney General John B. Shepperd declared any attempt at "too sudden mixture would be rash, imprudent and unwise."

Maryland's Attorney General Ferdinand Sybert urged "gradual adjustment, and that in time the state would solve the problem in a fair, decent and legal manner."

THE FINAL DECREE of the Court will apply specifically to Virginia, South Carolina, Kansas, Delaware and the District of Columbia which were directly involved in the cases on which the Court made its historic May 17, 1954 decision.

But it will affect all of the 17 states that maintain separate white and Negro schools.

While much of the South has adopted a "wait-and-see" policy pending the final decree, Mississippi, Georgia, Louisiana and South Carolina have declared they will continue segregation regardless of what the Supreme Court does.

Rather than follow a decree to end segregation soon, they say they will abolish public schools in those states.

The NAACP representatives who won the momentous decree last year are pressing uncompromisingly for an abrupt end of school Jim Crow as the big opening wedge in their campaign to end all forms of racial segregation in America by 1963, the 100th anniversary of the Emancipation Proclamation.

They believe that a Court decree effecting integration within a reasonably short period would deal a death blow to one of the vital organs in the octopus of racial segregation.

NAACP Presses For Radio Jobs

The Indianapolis branch of the NAACP, investigating the circumstances under which a proposed Negro radio station here would operate, believes something should be done immediately to secure employment for Negroes at the stations already in operation.

Robert D. DeFrantz, president released a statement of policy adopted by the branch members at a monthly meeting Friday last week.

The statement said: "We cannot at this time, lack powers of prophecy, determine whether the proposed radio station would serve the best or worst interests of those who are fighting the battle for integration in our community."

"However, it is most interesting that the existing vehicles of public communication are now taking the position that the Negro in this community deserves the benefit of complete integration."

"WE ARE CONFIDENT that in line with these recently expressed beliefs we can look forward to employment for Negroes in every phase of operations of these stations."

"We shall immediately ask for an appointment with each of them with the view of obtaining such employment."
