## Campaign to raise funds for new Red Cross Chapter

Eldon Campbell, Vice President and General Manager of the WFBM radio and TV stations in Indianapolis has accepted the Chairmanship of the Pacemakers (Big Gifts) Division of the Indianapolis Red Cross Chapter's campaign to raise the \$485,000 needed to complete the erection of its new Chapter House at the North end of Riley Center. This announcement was made today by former Governor Harold W. Handley, General Chairman of the campaign.

The Pacemakers section is seeking pledges of \$2,500 and upwards, payable over a three-year period from Foundations, Corporations and Individuals. Handley said he already has enlisted five teams, each consisting of six prominent community business men. Team Captains are: Willis B. Conner, Jr., Kenneth Valentine, Al Warner, Alex Carroll and Harold Buell.

Handley explained that the campaign merits the generous support of those who are being asked to contribute for four very excellent reasons. They are:

1. The need for the erection of this new building was forced on the Red Cross when the State of Indiana acquired the present Chapter House as a right-of-way for the new Interstate highway 65.
2. The buying of an existing building has been investigated thoroughly but it was found that the necessary alteration and renovation for Red Cross use of any available buildings would cost as much as buying land and erecting a new structure tailored to Red Cross needs. And it would still be an old building, Handley said. In addition, none of the available buildings had sufficient parking space for the needs of the thousands of Red Cross volunteers.
3. Every dollar contributed to this campaign will be matched by the Red Cross with \$1.27 from available funds.
4. This is the first time in its 50 years of service to our community that the Red Cross has asked for Capital Funds assistance for itself and this was only being asked now because of the emergency situation which has arisen. It had been thought that the present Chapter House could have been used for at least another two decades.

Handley said the intensive phase of the campaign is scheduled to begin November 1 and will end December 5. Approximately 300 volunteer workers will comprise the three soliciting divisions. Solicitation of past and present members of the Red Cross Board of Directors and the Chapter's regular staff members already is in progress.
