Bethune exhibition extended in D.C.

As a result of the widespread interest in the exhibition honoring Mary McLeod Bethune, the National Portrait Gallery-Smithsonian Institution, Washington, D.C., has announced that the showing of Bethune memorabilia will remain on view through August.

The National Gallery, located at F and Eighth Streets, N.W., is open daily from 10 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Adult and youth groups interested in special tours of the exhibition entitled, "Mary McLeod Bethune," are encouraged to call the Education Department, National Portrait Gallery, A-

rea Code 202/381-6347, in advance to arrange for a tour date.

The opening of the exhibition on June 19 coincided with ground breaking ceremonies for a Memorial to Mrs. Bethune in Lincoln Park, Washington, D.C. It includes photographs spanning her lifetime and documenting her role with world leaders; an ebony cane, which had belonged to President Franklin D. Roosevelt, presented to Mrs. Bethune by his wife, and a decoration awarded to her by the Republic of Liberia. The majority of the material is on loan from Bethune-Cookman College, Daytona Beach, Florida, which she founded.

The planned Memorial to Mary McLeod Bethune is sponsored by the National Council of Negro Women who have obtained an extension of the Presidential and congressional authorization necessary to erect what will be the first memorial to a black American on public land in the nation's capital.

This living tribute to one of America's most renowned educators is envisioned as long overdue recognition of the black man's heritage and contribution to American life. It must be erected without cost to the Federal Government.

Mrs. Bethune founded the National Council of Negro Women in 1935. Today, it is a coalition of 25 nationally affiliated organizations with an outreach to approximately 3.8 million women, and is recognized as a catalyst in the field of social action. Dorothy I. Height is the national president.

Rare bits from Adeline

The careful shopper will want to compare costs of equal size servings of home-prepared and commercially-prepared foods to be sure she is not paying more for convenience than she intends. To be realistic, you have to consider that you are buying built-in services - cleaning, peeling, mixing and cooking. You can save as much as half on your jellies, jams and preserves by making your own. In fact, you can save more than that if you are the type who likes to go wild berry picking.

First of all, you will want to watch the ads for sugar specials and buy it ahead. Then watch at the market for good buys on fruit.

I used this recipe last year then later used it for my Christmas gifts. It makes nine medium jelly jars. Of course,

it is not necessary that you use jelly jars - any type of small jar around the house serves this purpose well, particularly baby food jars.

SPICED PEACH JAM
4 cups chopped peaches
2 tablespoons lemon juice
2 teaspoons cinnamon
5 1/2 cups sugar
1 box powdered pectin

Mix powdered pectin with finely chopped peaches, lemon juice, and cinnamon in a saucepan. Bring mixture quickly to a hard boil, stirring occasionally. At once add the sugar. Bring to full rolling boil and boil hard one minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Stir 5 minutes. Pour into jars.

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
