



"Lest We Forget," Rev. 14:13—And I heard a voice from Heaven saying unto me write. Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord from henceforth; yea, saith the Spirit, that they may rest from their labors; and their works do follow them.

November 3, 1867 after many house to house prayer meetings, the Lick Creek Baptist Church, now the Olivet Baptist Church was organized. It was situated on the Stoughten Fletcher farm. The Cove-

nent was read and a council was called. There were eight charter members as follows: Brothers William Jones, Tony Robinson, Caswell Howard, Cain Leonard, John Lewis, Benjamin Young, Sister Fannie Young and Sister Sarah Leonard.

Rev. G. L. Lillard was called to pastor this church May, 1930. He has labored in this field twenty seven years.

## History Of The Eastern Star Baptist Church

The Eastern Star Baptist Church was organized in 1920 with nine charter members present. Rev. Johnson was installed as pastor. He was succeeded by Rev. C. H. Poole. Rev. Freeman and Rev. Henry Whittaker.

In 1933 Rev. John T. Weeden was called and pastored for sixteen years. Under his leadership our present church was erected in 1945. The membership increased from 150 to 900.

He was succeeded in 1948 by our present pastor, Rev. P. C. Owens. Through his guidance the church has overcome the serious damages of two fires, and paid the mortgage on church property. The church has also grown, spititually, financially and numerically.

Shilch was organized in 1897 by the late Dr. J. I. Saunders who started a beautiful job.





## History Of The Missionary Of The Mt. Carmel Baptist Church

The Senior Missionary was organized in the year 1897 with Mrs. Lula Broyles, the pastor's wife, as President. These pioneers were truly missionary minded. They sought out those in need;—the widows, the orphans, the sick and the distressed—made visits to the Marion County Home, and rendered services readily. Women from this group, answering the call of missions, formed the first Children's Band. Some of these children who were converted in this group are now workers in the Missionary. After the State Convention gave the leadership of the Camp Fire Girls and Cadet Boys to the Missionary Department, the Star Light Band, Shepherd Boys League, and W. W. G. were organized by the women from the Missionary. These youth organizations were rated among the best trained in the State.

On January 13, 1942, the Junior Missionary was organized by Mrs. F. F. Young, President of the Central Senior Women. Mrs. Farmer, Rev. C. H. Walton, and Rev. F. F. Young were also present. These Junior Missionaries made regular visits to Flower Mission, held meetings with the sick and shut-ins, and helped to make a Merry Christmas for patients of the Booker Nursing Home and Riley Hospital. During World War II, the members of the Junior group wrote to all the boys in service from the church and the community, sending them church news and words of cheer. In September, 1944, the Junior Women sponsored an Honors Day Program at the church which honored the mothers and wives of the boys in service. During this program, flags were presented to the church. In January, 1948, the group began giving Bibles to the converts of the church and this project is being continued today.

Women who served as Presidents of the Junior Women were: Mrs. Mary Oldham, 1942-1943; Mrs. Lois Taylor, 1944-1945; Mrs. Margaret Sparks, 1946-1947; Mrs. Helen Akers, 1948-1951.

In the year of 1951 this group was promoted to Senior Missionaries and served as Group No. 2.

On January 17, 1952, due to physical inabilities of some of the older members of Seniors No. 1, the groups were consolidated at the home of Mrs. L. Farmer (at that time Secretary and Treasurer). Sister Farmer, who was the only charter member of the church, was called home in May, 1952. Her life was that of a devout Christian woman, full of sacrifices and of service for Jesus Christ and her Church. She had been a Sunday School teacher for fifty years, and served as a pillar in the Missionary and as a leader in all the youth departments of the church. As a living memorial to the life of one who was loved throughout the state, the Missionary was given the name of The Lillian Farmer Missionary during a program on Mother's Day in 1954. Each department of the church, Mrs. F. F. Young, representing the District, and Mrs. A. Washington, representing the State, took part in the program, the theme of which was "Let Your Light Shine." We believe that Mrs. Farmer was a true Missionary and a Mother who let her light

# History of Colored Baptists In Indiana

Edited by Rev. J. T. Highbaugh, D. D. Collected by Rev. F. F. Young, D. D.

#### **PREFACE**

This work is a limited effort to collect, compile and edit a history of the beginnings and achievements of Baptist Institutions.

In August, 1927 the Indiana Negro Baptist Association appointed a Commission on History. Because of lack of funds then and the depression later nothing was done other than a mimeographed copy provided for the Diamond Jubilee in 1932.

This idea grew up from previous recommendation made by the Compiler in his first Annual Address, May, 1927.

With the apparent disregard for the History Item in the State Associations, the Central District Baptist Association resumed their activities for Baptist History and appropriated \$10.00 as an initial appropriation, and this is the result.

Too much appreciation for this work cannot be given Rev. Moses Broyles, History of Baptists published in 1876, Mrs. J. R. Miller, wife of Rev. J. R. Miller, Rev. J. D. Ronse, Rev. N. A. Seymour, Rev. B. F. Farrell, Rev. G. W. Ward, Rev. B. J. F. Westbrooks (deceased). Rev. R. D. Leonard, Rev. W. Z. Thomas, Rev. J. D. Johnson, Rev. G. L. Lillard, Rev. R. M. Dehoney, Rev. J. R. Averett, Mrs. Mattie D. Griggsby Anderson, Mrs. E. J. K. Hines, Rev. L. R. Mitchell, Rev. F. Frank Young, C. C. Goins, W. H. Anderson and M. C. Anderson.

These, verbally or written, gave invaluable aid in our work, and may this information be a real inspiration to the Youth of Tomorrow.

#### CHAPTER I

#### Pioneer Life

The beginnings of Colored Baptist activities in Indiana goes back to the days when runaway slaves and freed men came to the north as a haven of rest. Many crossed the Ohio River to New Albany while shers adventured further upstate to Indianapolis. Those who came to New Albany organized the First Baptist Church, while, those who came to Indianapolis organized the Second Baptist Church. These Churches were organized about 1846. It is deposited which was organized first. Yet, more is about Second Baptist Church, Indianapolis First Baptist Church, New Albany.

Rev. Charles Sachell, formerly Pastor of the union Baptist Church, Cincinnati, came to Indianapolis and organized the Second Baptist Church in the home of Deacon John Brown. The next Pastor was Rev. Joshua Thurman who built the first house on Missouri Street between New York and Chio Streets. This building was burned down. Many believe it was burned either by white enemies of Calored churches or enemies within as there was general confusion within the little church.

In 1852 Rev. Joseph J. Fitsgerald was called. He was an ex-pastor from the St. Paul Baptist Church of Madison, Indiana, from which gossip and accusations came and he was forced to leave. He was also one of our pioneer school teachers. He founded the Church in Deacon Browns home and moved them to their new church. From 1854 to 1855 Rev. George Butler served.

During the year of 1855 Rev. Pleasant Boular came from Kalamazoo, Michigan. Collecting money for his church there. Later it was found that he had fraudulently collected these funds and that he was negotiating to carry a group of members into the A.M.E. Church. This caused his resignation.

In 1857 there was a young man in the community, who was teaching school on Minerva Street. He had belonged to the Christian Church in Kentucky, but had been baptized by a Baptist preacher. This young man, Moses Broyles, joined Second Baptist in 1857 after Rev. Pleasant Boular had left. He was ordained by a council, one preacher from Columbus, Ohio and one from Rushville, Indiana, and a layman John Brown. The anti-slavery struggle, the battle with Rev. Boular and the abject poverty, all combined to make his Ministry hard sleighing.

During these dark days an attempt was made to foster an Association which went down in defeat because of the intervention of white opponents of Negro Baptist Union and ignorant divisions among themselves and distance of travel. This association was the Old Galation Association. Churches in it were First Baptist, New Albany; First Baptist, Charleston; St. Paul, Madison; Zion Baptist, Blue River, and Second Baptist, Indianapolis.

Simultanious with the growth of Second Baptist Church in Indianapolis is also that of First Baptist Church of New Albany. For many, many years it served as an underground railway for fugitive slaves. During the later part of the fifties there grew up free and slave factions which rent the church in two later. This is the present Second Baptist Church.

These were truly dark days. Days when men verily walked by faith and not by sight.

#### CHAPTER II

## Beginnings

Coincidentally, we have built these great adventures in Baptist History around Second Baptist Church and Rev. Moses Broyles. But the energy and work he invested will convince you that our interpretation is not a coincidence but a providence. Truly, this was the Moses for a time like this. Face to face with a divided Nation. Fearful of any white face, lonely for their lost parents or children separated from them by slavery, these people from scores of slave communities were making the seeming impossible effort to work together. Therefore, the beginning of the Indiana Baptist Association was born out of the fertile brain of this saintly sage, and the wavy motion of the great Second Baptist Church.

The Association met in Second Baptist Church in September, 1858 with the following churches represented. First Baptist, Charleston; First Baptist, New Albany; and Second Baptist, Indianapolis. There were nine Messengers. St. Paul Baptist Church, Madison was invited but because of the fact that Second Baptist had called Rev. J. J. Fitsgerald whom they counted unworthy, they refused to come. As before stated, this same vexing conflict had destroyed the Old Galation Association and loomed with doom to this new attempt at Baptist cooperation.

The first Constitution was written by Rev. Mose's Brovles and Henry H. White, a licensed Minister. At first a strona anti-slavery item was in the constitution but the down state brethren and our southern brethren advised that should we want their fellowship it would be unwise to put in an anti-slavery clause as it would make it difficult for them. Among our out of state brethren were Rev. G. W. Dupee and Rev. Sanford Howard of Paducah and Lexington, Kentucky, respectfully.

The organization of the Association and the freedom made possible by the Lord's Hand through the Courage of President Abraham Lincoln caused the organization of many Churches during the ensuing years.

In 1866 the White Lick Baptist Church was organized near Bridgeport with thirteen members, among whom were Ruben Walker and Frank Ellis return soldiers of the Civil War. Rev. Benjamin Gardener was first pastor. Sister Lucinda Ellis was also a charter member of the church. Some great Pastors have labored here. White people gave them their first property, and it was long used as a schoolhouse and church. Outstanding Pastors have been Reverends J. A. Preston, G. A. Martin, R. B. Green,

J. H. Patterson, Frank G. Brookins, G. W. Gore, Wm. Gill, Wm. Edwards, Sandy Gaston, E. F. Blakely and W. S. Wilson.

After the enlargement of Second Baptist Church, fire again destroyed the place of worship and in 1867 the present site was procured at Michigan and Indiana Ave.

About nine miles southwest of the city a small community of worshipers met in what was known as Fletchers Bottoms. Many of these came out of Lick Creek Baptist about 1869. This Fletchers Bottom Church was known as the Mt. Zion Baptist Church and was organized in 1869. They then moved to the I.C.L. Railroad and Second Streets, now at Eleventh and Lafayette Streets. Rev. Andrew Simmons was the first pastor preaching two Sundays per month here and also for the Lick Creek Church.

This Lick Creek Church was organized in 1867, also by Rev. Andrew Simmons and Rev. Leonard, father of our beloved Rev. R. D. Leonard. Benjamin Young made the motion. This was nine miles south of the city in a little church donated by the white people of the community. Later this congregation moved on Hosbrook Street and was known as Olivet Boptist Church. Some of its leading Pastors were as follows: Rev. Andrew Simmons, Rev. R. D. Leonard. Rev. L. M. Leonard, Rev. John Preston, Rev. C. W. Lewis, Rev. J. T. Martin, Rev. W. F. Oldham, Rev. A. Brown, Rev. K. Warren, and Rev. G. L. Lillard.

In 1872 the Mt. Zion Baptist Church moved to the I.C.L. Railroad site and since has had the following pastors; Rev. Wm. Singleton, Rev. J. M. Morton, Rev. B. F. Farrell, Rev. G. W. Ward, Rev. S. B. Butler, Rev. M. A. Talley and Rev. R. T. Andrews.

In 1872 the Georgetown Baptist Church was organized five miles northwest of the city. It moved in town on Old Rhode Island Street, and was later known as Tabernacle Baptist. Some of its greatest pastors were Rev. Christopher Wilson, Rev. C. H. Perry, Rev. Shobe, Rev. G. R. Ford, Rev. L. C. Whitly, Rev. Jones and Rev. B. H. Gardener.

In 1875 Rev. Thomas Smith organized South Calvary out of a combination of members from down behind the Old Rolling Mills and a group from Fletchers Bottoms. Coupled with a positive resentment to those who would come in to town with them in 1872, and also the fact that as the others did not approve of the fixing a levy to prevent property destruction. They worked on levy and were excluded from the Mt. Zion Church and were taken in by the ones who worked at the Rolling Mills. These formed the South Calvary Baptist Church. Rev. Thomas Smith was the first pastor. They later selected a site at Morris and Maple Streets and was known as South Calvary Baptist Church. The pastors were: Rev. Thomas Smith, Rev. Charles F. Williams, Rev. G. L. Lillard, Rev. J. T. Highbaugh, Rev. S. S. Thomas, Rev. V. W. McLawler and L. A. Man-

In 1875 Rev. Jacob R. Raynor organized New Bethel Baptist Church in the northeast part of the city. This church has had the following pastors; Rev. J. R. Raynor, Rev. N. A. Seymour, Rev. George Baltimore, Rev. J. O. Clark and the present pastor is Rev. F. Benjamin Davis.

Probably this great Church activity is decidedly traceable to two great organizations which started about these times. The State Sunday School Convention was first started among laymen and established schools whenever even a handful of members could be found. The Sunday School Convention was started in 1867 by the leading laymen who headed the organization. Many of these fine Churches grew out of a great need for the good news. The Ministers and Deacons Convention was organized in 1870 with a membership of twelve Ministers and five Deacons.

Probably the last great achievement of Rev. Moses Broyles was to attend the formation of the National Baptist Convention in Montgomery, Alabama in 1880. Rev. Broyles fell quietly to rest in 1882. Truly, with Moses Broyles' homegoing a great son of thunder and pioneer for right departed. He was Moderator from 1858-68 and was of great assistance to these early Moderators; Rev. Lewis Artis, 1869-73; Richard Bassett, 1874; J. I. Winyard, 1875 and Green McFarland, 1876-83. Some very early Missionaries of these pioneer days were Rev. C. Davis, 1867-73; W. H. Anderson, 1873-74-Miles Bassett, 1875-83.

Along about 1865 the Smithfield Baptist Church of Rockport, Indiana was organized by Rev. George Fields and also the Friendship Baptist Church of Evansville, Indiana by Rev. Green McFarland.

#### LOCAL BAPTIST CHURCHES MERGE

Serving to meet a long felt need in the northern section of the city, two northside Baptist churches have joined together recently their membership and resources.

The merged churches are the New Era Baptist church, located at Sixteenth Street and Boulevard Place and the Northside Baptist church, located at Thirtieth Street and Ethel Avenue. Hereafter the place of worship of the two congregations will be at Thirtieth Street and Ethel Avenue. The church home will be known as the Northside-New Era Baptist church.

The Rev. Marshall A. Talley, A.M., D.D., present pastor of the New Era Baptist church, has been elected pastor of the new church union. He is nationally known and enjoys an enviable reputation national affairs of the Baptist church. Rev. Tales is a minister, scholar and educator of the first ran of the land.

He is national director of Religious Education of the National Baptist Convention, Inc. He has been an editor and has served in an editorial capacity several periodicals of the Baptist denomination is the author of two books. "A Socratic Exposor of Genesis" and "The Negro Baptist in Forem Missions." Rev. Talley is a former member of Indiana General Assembly, elected from Indiana General Assembly, elected from Indiana Public Welfare Board.

Rev. Talley is well fitted for service in the new spirit of the church and the immediately new era of his activities. The merger of the two churches is also constructive, following the spirit of service in a new era of human affairs. The example set in this instance might be followed to promote better spiritual and community service, not only by church groups of the community but in other areas of the Nation.

#### CHAPTER III

### Expansion

The year 1880 was somewhat of a turning point in the Church life of Indiana. The National Baptist Convention was organized. Two years later Rev. Moses Broyles passed away and Rev. J. R. Miller who had much to do with the Baptist Missionary History came into prominence.

Upon the ushering in of the eighty's came also the beginnings of the Corthian Baptist Church, Rev. Peter Vertiese was the first pastor and upon his return to Gallatin, Tennessee, his former pastorate Rev. Bassett took over.

Rev. Bassett served as Pastor until 1890. Other pastors have been the Reverends J. G. Blackshear, H. H. Harris, V. W. McLawler, G. A. Martin, J. Franklin Walker, I. M. Hendon, Wm. Harris, W. E. Ramsey and D. C. Venerable. The new brick church was built in 1919. Rev. L. M. Hendon as pastor.

1883 the death of Rev. Green McFarland had occurred at Liberty Baptist Church, Evansville, which effected the whole state. Rev. McFarland preferred the call of Rev. W. H. Anderson a young school teacher there and upon his death bed recommended him. But the people thought differently and called Rev. J. D. Rouse a young man in the congregation. This coused a split in Liberty which caused the formation of the McFarland Baptist Church and the organization of the Eastern Baptist Association. Rev. W. H. Anderson being acquainted in the Eastern part of the state organized this association with twenty-three churches and later in 1884 was compelled to recommend it as a District Association with him as Moderator. But in

1885 it was made a State organization.

Upon this division Rev. W. H. Anderson was made Moderator of Eastern Association and Rev. J. R. Miller of the General Association. This year \$138.12 was raised. Rev. J. E. Artis was made Missionary. At this same session a council was formed by request of Second Baptist Church, Brazil, to ordain a preacher which was done and cancelled after hearing him preach. At this 1883 session also a Mrs. Steward of Evansville recommended the organization of Missionary Societies in the Churches. Mrs. Tichner a representative of the White Association known as the Judson Association introduced the possibility of this work.

This same year a great leader came to the fore John R. Miller. Coming up from Kentucky he organized a church from whence he moved on to Mitchell, organized a church there in 1870. He

pastored at Bloomington Second Baptist Church succeeding Rev. John Ganns in 1875 and was ordained for this church by the General Association 1875 at Lost Creek, Indiana. During 1874 and 1875 he pastored the Second Baptist Church Crawfordsville and also the Second Baptist Church Lafayette.

Outstanding laymen helped in these churches. Brother Toliver Hawkins raised \$798 to procure first lot in Crawfordsville and Brother John Levering gave a lot and his brother gave brick to build Second Baptist Church in Lafayette.

Rev. Miller also Pastored Second Baptist, Shelby-ville 1876. First Edinburg in 1880 and Pastored Mt. Pilgrim 1911-1915. He also organized the Church at Sullivan 1909, Lincoln City 1906 and pastored Smithfield, Rockport in 1905-1909. When I think of John R. Miller my mind travels anew with great Bible Characters like Paul, who founded the churches of long, long ago. From 1880 to 1912 he frequently served as Moderator or Missionary of the General Association.

Things were also occurring during these days in the city. In 1885 John Jones, John Ray and others started First Baptist Church in North Indianapolis near Edgemont and Rader Streets. John Jones mortgaged his house to pay for the first property. Rev. Richard Bassett was the first pastor. Others were Rev. Simmons, Rev. Ferguson, Rev. Gregory and Rev. Dunn. Rev. F. F. Young is the present pastor, having served since 1907. The present unit was built in 1922 and paid out of debt in 1938.

By 1901 the General Association had held together and had fifty-four ordained Elders and twelve licensed Ministers. Rev. J. D. Rouse was Moderator. Mission work was being done at Ft. Wayne, Lawrenceburg, Greensburg and North Vernon, Rev. W. H. Patterson was a Missionary. A school was in contemplation. Number of members 18,282, number of churches 46, property value \$144,269.20 and number of additions 522. In 1903 the Rev. W. Z. Thomas was president of the Sunday School Convention. \$116.96 was raised. A publishing house was being promoted by Marian County B.Y.P.U., but it died almost at birth. A paper called the Indiana Informer was put out about a year and a half. \$31.00 given to State University. Rev. J. C. Patton was the Editor of the paper and operator of the press.

In 1896 the W.H.F.M. Convention was organized and in 1897 the B.Y.P.U. Convention cards and dancing was vigorously tabooed as an amusement.

Strong resolutions were offered against wine rooms and youth frequenting. In 1909 the Eastern Association Presided over by Rev. N. A. Seymoure. J. R. Averett a Missionary met in New Bethel Baptist Church, Indianapolis. Some of the Churches in the Eastern Association at that time was New Bethel, Indianapolis; Second Baptist, Charleston; Mt. Carmel and Corinthian, Indianapolis; First Baptist, West Baden, Ill. Ave. Jeffersonville; First Baptist, North Indianapolis; Second Baptist, Madison and New Albany; First Baptist, Noblesville; Mt. Zion. Connersville; First Baptist, Corydon and Second Whiteland; First, Gary; Second, Kokomo; Shi-

loh, Rising Sun; Second, Rushville; Ft. Wayne and Howard Chapel, New Albany. Great Preachers in Eastern Association were Reverends M. Caruthers, N. Ray, J. L. Mason, W. H. Jones, W. H. Payne, G. A. Martin, F. F. Young, M. C. Elzy, S. C. Manuel, J. F. Broyles, E. P. Zinmerman, M. Goins, H. B. Cox, A. H. Shemake, M. L. Tooney, H. Brown, G. R. Redd, A. J. Arnold and Wm. Winfery.

The General Association had such churches as Calvary, Muncie: Second, Anderson; Second, Indianapolis; Second, Shelbyville; Second, Terre Haute: Second, Brazil; Smithfield, Rockport, and McFarland, Evansville. Second, Franklin; Second, Columbus: Second, Edinburg: Mt. Zion, Indianapolis: Tabernacle, Indianapolis: Olivet, S. Calvary, Mt. Pilarim, First W. Indianapolis, and Second Baptist, New Albany.

Many represented in both associations as later on there was no rancor whatever between them, and at this 1909 session the Ministers Association, Women's Convention, B.Y.P.U. and S.S. Conventions all recommended a United Indiana.

Some great Churches organized were Mt. Carmel 1891, Antioch 1889, Shiloh 1897, Metropolitan 1902, Mt. Paran 1906, Mt. Olive 1910, Ebeneezer 1908. Great Eastern Association Moderators were:

#### CHAPTER IV

## Battling For Union

Growing out of ojitation of the Sunday School B.Y.P.U. and Women workers in 1912 a Union Meeting, between the General and Eastern Association met in Calvary Baptist Church, Muncie, and formed the Indiana Negro Missionary Baptist State Association. Rev. G. W. Ward and first Moderator, Rev. M. M. Porter, Secretary, Rev. C. W. McCall, Corresponding Secretary.

The first Annual session was held with Mt. Zion

Baptist Church, Indianapolis, Rev. G. W. Ward, Pastor in 1913.

There were 56 churches, 65 ordained Ministers representing 3071 members \$458.96 was raised for all causes. Mrs. C. C. Goines at this session suggested to the W.H.F.M. Convention the procurring of an old Ministers' and Laymen's Home. \$16.12 jointly was paid on this property and by the opening of 1914 a house was bought on Bond St. in Indianapolis, for this purpose. The Women's Convention took the leadership in this adventure and therefore it was left under their direction. Mrs. Mattie D. Griggsby was made State Corresponding Secretary of the State Women's Convention.

Rev. C. W. McCall, Rev. C. W. Lewis and Attorney Breckenridge conducted a mighty useful training school during the year of 1914. Also they had a very successful periodical. "The Trinity Evangel."

In 1914 Rev. J. H. Roberts, pastor of Antioch Baptist Church, was made Moderator, but to the sorrow of the brotherhood he passed away during the same year. Rev. R. D. Leonard of Connersylle was elected at the New Bethel Baptist Church as Moderator in 1915.

Another epochal event of 1915 was the split of the National Baptist Convention in Chicago. One faction held that the convention should be incorporated so as to hold property while the other group held that this was merely a ruse to take over control of the publishing board. The incorporation group held that Rev. R. H. Boyd had illegally taken over the Publishing board's property for personal use. While the Boyd supporters contended that they were compelled to form a New Organization or continue their organization away from the Convention Hall. Now this division of the brotherhood passed on down through the different states. Tearing up churches, splitting Minister Meetings and dividing states, all over the country. Indiana did not escape this ill effect. For such men as Reverend B. F. Westbrook, G. W. Ward, C. M. C. Hammond M. M. Porter, C. E. Hawkins, J. S. Crittenden, A. W. Smith, W. H. Anderson, J. D. Rouse and N. E. Joseph, J. L. Masin were strong supporters of the Morris Convention. While such leaders as Reverends B. F. Farrell, J. D. Johnson, C. W. Lewis, N. A. Seymour, G. L. Lillard, R. D. Leonard, G. A. Martin, J. F. Broyles, F. F. Young, F. L. Marris, W. Z. Thomas, W. R. Payne and W. L. Green were strong supporters of Rev. R. H. Boyd. So you see the State was about evenly divided on this question therefore when the Association met in New Albany with Rev. W. M. Winfry the Women's Convention was torn almost asunder by the schism. The Author was being aided in school. At Simmons University at that time by the great Second Baptist Church, and at this 1916 session the state voted to assist him. Because of the National issue and tht the author belanged to Rev. F. F. Young's church the Rev. Westbrook advised his members to discontinue their responsibility to him and let the Association have the privilege.

There came up also in this Meeting the question of whether the Association would represent a body in either National Convention the incorpor-

ated in Atlanta, Ga., or the Unincorporated in Kansas City. The association voted that they would not represent as a body at either place, but they would arganize as a committee prior to the conventions.

Following this procedure as they stated the Incorparated group met in Mt. Zion Baptist Church and prepared their going to Atlanta Meeting. Yet it got out that they were organizing a New Ministers' Alliance. Therefore at the Baptist Ministers' Union they voted to represent as a body in Kansas City. This widened the group more and more and by February, 1917 the Women's Convention was incorporated as the Boyd group stated, as a protective measure. This widened the group more and more and by February, 1917 stated above was done. This was followed by the organization of Union Baptist District Association, Rev. B. J. F. Westbrook, Moderator. This Association began as a District but because it seemed to have no geographical limitation it was difficult in the face of the suspicion and unrest at large to determine its real motive. It reached from Lafayette to Bloomington from Terre Haute to Indianapolis.

Also in the year of 1917 Reverends B. J. F. Westbrook, I. M. Herdon, B. F. Farrell and A. W. Smith met with Rev. U. M. McQuire and Rev. Carlos Dinsmore executive secretary of Indiana Baptist Convention and worked out a very strong cooperative Missionary Program with the White and Colored Baptist. Rev. W. Z. Thomas then Pastor of Union Tabernacle Baptist Church was pursuaded to take the Field as State Missionary, and White Baptist assume one half his salary and expenses. By this time the "Indiana Baptist Herald" published by Rev. W. Z. Thomas and C. W. Lewis had gone down. But during its publication it was a very serviceable paper.

In the winter of 1919, January at the Second Baptist Church a Peace Commission met representing Union District and the State Association. These peace conditions were, that the Union District and Central District and other districts would be the channel for National Representation, that State Association nor any of its auxiliaries would represent in any National Baptist Convention, that equal representation be given Union District brethren an all Boards, Auxiliaries and elective officers, and that money would go to National and State causes as designated on letters.

It was alleged in the 1920 session at Mt. Paran that this agreement was being broken. And that in 1919 at the Unincorporated Convention the Moderator, Rev. Leonard and the brethren represented with Association money. Though nothing definite was proven the breach was made much wider by the fact of the meeting of the National Baptist Convention in Indianapolis 1920. I mean the Morris Faction of the Convention.

Encouraged by the success of the Incorporated National Baptist Convention, the Union District enlarged itself into the Union Baptist State Convention. This was done in 1921.

The Union that was formed in 1913 was not strong enough to stand in Western Indiana. Cer-

tain engrained prejudices that Reverends Estell, G. A. Long, W. E. Clark, Wm. Dickerson and J. R. Averett had with Reverends J. D. Johnson and W. Z. Thomas influenced them to organize the Mt. Olive District State Association covering parts of Terre Haute, Evansville, Sullivan, Vincennes and other parts. They bought an Old Folks Home at Vincennes which is almost out of debt at this writing. About 1919 Rev. W. H. Anderson passed away which made this division possible, and Rev. Rouse was breaking in years, thus leaving the field open for division.

During these years quite a number of young people were sent away to school. Among them were J. T. Highbaugh to Simmons University, Lee Motly to Simmons University, Emma Booker to Northern Baptist Missionary Training School, Artie Pendleton to Simmons, Irene Ritter to National Missionary Training School and Bessie Franklin to Simmons University, also John Hall and many others to Simmons University.

In 1919 Mrs. Mattie D. Griggsby Anderson served as Dean of Women of Simmons University. In 1920 Mrs. Emma Lillard served in the same position.

Rev. C. W. Lewis was the President of the S. S. Convention from 1919 to 1930 during 1921 organized Boy Cadet Movements and sponsored our first Daily Vacation Bible School, one at Mt. Parch and the other at Olivet.

Convention, which assumed great prominence.

Rev. H. A. King was president of the B.Y.P.U. Mrs. E. H. Hines was President of the Missionary Convention from 1913 onto now serving her thirty-fourth year. She had built up the W. W. G. under Mrs. A. White and Anna Thomas, and the Children's Convention under Mrs. Lula Grubbs Webb Blythe.

Unity seemed impossible in these days of dark struggle. Numbers of messengers in 1920 at Association 114, Churches 56 and membership 19,-494.

#### CHAPTER V

## Modern Baptist History

The large influence of our people from the South and the areat industries of Northern Indiana made it a great Mission Field. Such towns as Garrett, Ft. Wayne, South Bend, Gary, East Chicago, Hammond, Indiana Harbor and Elkhart beckoned Missionary W. Z. Thomas northward and his strongest supporter in those great adventures was the Rev. Charles E. Hawkins. So because of his onflowing energy and supreme benevolence he was elected unanimously Moderator in the 1922 session of the Association of Connersville, Ind.

A new day dawned for Baptist Work in Indiana, churches sprung up at all the places mentioned above. The Northern District Association which was organized in 1920 aided in tying them to the State Association. Rev. M. V. Booling was first

Moderator, Rev. W. F. Frazier followed.

About 18 churches were in the building business, the Mission work well organized; the Moderator proceeded to try at solving the great state National debacle. So in 1924 a delegation was sent to both Conventions, Incorporated in Nashville, the Unincorporated in Chicago, but the National Convention Incorporated sent the money back.

In 1925 the Union Association suggested a cooperative Educational project which was rejected on the grounds that out and out union or nothing else was wanted by the Association.

This year also the Young W.W.G. had a survey of their history since their organization in 1911 in the Second Baptist Church, Shelbyville by Mrs. E. J. K. Hines and Mrs. Mattie D. Griggsby.

Superintendents and Presidents of this Organization have been:

Superintendents, Ida Mae Myler, Mrs. E. B. Hendon, Mrs. Anna C. Thomas.

Presidents, Ethel Buckner, Malinda Wherry, Emma Booker, Irene Ritter, Bessie Franklin, Nancy M. Corley, total collection \$1,174.

During this year Mission work was being done at Pilgrim, Ft. Wayne, Plat Glass, Kokomo, Rockville and St. James, Terre Haute. White Baptist gave \$1,881.08, while we raised \$1,240.36. Because of our non payment of subscriptions and the \$20,000 endebtedness of the Indiana Baptist Convention they dropped off their pay list The Baptist Mission Gleaner.

Rev. J. D. Clark who had been appointed Foreign Missionary was given during the year \$350.

The Women's Convention Mortgaged the house on Bond Street and borrowed \$1,000 to pay on another house on Bond Street.

In 1927 the Women's Convention bought a 15-room house at 1831 N. Capitol Avenue for an Old Ministers and Laymens Home and Baptist Head-quarters. The down payment was made and one of the Band Street houses was turned in on this debt of \$11,000.

In 1926 Rev. W. Z. Thomas left the field and took the Calvary Baptist Church. Rev. E. O. Price was elected State Missionary.

In 1928 the Central District met at Garfield Baptist Church. A program of Baptist History, Ordaination, Organization and State Aid was initiated \$758.90 was raised. Southeastern raised \$344.65, Northwestern Association raised \$458.28.

In 1928 the State Association met at Metropolitan, Indianapolis, Rev. C. E. Hawkins was Moderator. This year the Program was:

- 1. A press in the headquarters
- 2. An educational director-
- 3. A budget system for the state

Money raised at session, \$1,317.87 and \$1,990.– 54 raised on the field. The White Baptist this year gave \$1,000 for the Work, but they refused to give any aid whatever from then on. Many believed that because the White Baptist Headquarters cost them \$7,000 and ours \$11,000, they may have thought it extravagance to give to our work. But as the White brethern never breathed such we saw no right to infer it. The Women's Convention this year raised \$758.65. Rev. J. T. Highbaugh was elected Director of Religious Education, giving us our present S.S. and B.Y.P.U. Convention set up.

In 1934 the Moderator was sent to the World's Baptist Alliance in Berlin, Germany to be our representative.

1932 was celebrated as the Diamond Jubilee of our State Association. Every thing met in Mt. Paran Baptist Church. There may be a difference of a year in interpretation but yet we had a great time. Over \$2,000 was raised for all the causes, yet it was in the depths of the depression.

In 1935 Rev. J. I. Saunders of Shiloh Baptist Church, Indianapolis, was elected Moderator. Rev. Saunders came to Indianapolis from Cincinnation, built a beautiful brick structure and is giving a fine leadership for our work. The 1925 session was difficult because of the absence of the Presiding Moderator Rev. Hawkins, because of illness. Many felt the coming of Rev. Saunders to the Moderatorship named at the illness of Rev. Hawkins was unfair while others felt that as his year was out and the office belonged to the body, they could justly elect whom they pleased.

In 1935 also at Bloomington Rev. S. S. Reed was elected President of the Indiana Baptist Convention. Many Churches in northern Indiana and around Evansville forsook the old State Association and went to the State Convention.

In 1936 the long dreamed of press was put in the Baptist Headquarters, and operated for the good of the work. Rev. Saunders is a strong aggressive leader and has a Budget Program of \$1.00 per Member in each Baptist Church as a goal.

In 1938 covering all the work we averaged about \$2,400.00.

## Organizational Data

Sunday School Convention started in 1867. Ministers and Deacons convention began in 1870 and Missionary Society began in 1883 led by Mrs. Steward of Evansville, Indiana. A Mrs. Fichner a representative of the White Association known as the Judson Association introduced the possibility of this work. 1896 the WHEF Convention, and 1897 the BYPU Convention was started.

Mrs. C. C. Goens suggested at the 1913 session of WH&FM Convention to buy and maintain an aged ministers and laymens home. Thus \$160.12 jointly was raised and paid on property at 2466 Bond Street. The property now owned by John J. Young, son of Elder F. F. Young. The women took the lead in this adventure. Being left to their decision, they joined with the brethren and mortgaged

the Band St. property for \$1,000 to pay on another house next door to 2466 Bond St.

In 1927 they bought a 15-room house at 1831 N Capitol Avenue as a home for aged ministers and Laymen now known as Baptist Headquarters where The Indiana Baptist Seminary holds their classes.

A down payment was made and one of the houses on Bond Street was turned in on the \$11,000 debt at Capitol Avenue. The debt has been paid under the Moderatorship of Dr. C. H. Bell and the late Pres. Mrs. E. J. K. Hines, who was president from 1913 to her death in 1952.

The YWW Guild was built up under Mrs. Alice White and the late Anna Thomas it was organized in 1911 in Shelbyville, Ind. The Children's Convention under Mrs. Lulu Webb was a thriving unit.

The late Dr. C. H. Hawkins, Moderator of the association representing in the National Conven-

A resolution was adopted August 9, 1928. The Negro Baptist State Association shall not represent the National Baptist Convention Unincorporated but each church and its auxiliaries shall have the right to represent in either National Baptist Convention (Article 3, Section 1). Article 9 required that all financial agents of the association must give bond not later than 40 days after seting of association.

Motion prevailed to receive no more checks unless they were certified or cashier's checks.

1928 the following ministers were given life membership; Elders R. D. Leonard, G. H. Tipton, J. D. Rouse, A. Higgins, N. A. Seymour and W. R. Payne, D. D. A. M. L. L. D. who is the only living member. He is now in St. Louis, Mo. Late Rev. George Baltimore secured 125 signatures to the Temperance Pledge in New Bethel in 1929.

Rev. Walter Highbaugh, Chairman of State Temperance Board, is trying his best to get every Christian to pledge.

We have lost the art of sending corresponding messengers to other state associations in Ky., Ohio, and others.

We had steropitcal slides of the old workers, churches, and many other interesting pictures, however seems that they have gone in to stay. The machine was left at Baptist Headquarters.

1923 in Jeffersonville, Indiana, Rev. J. D. Rouse, R. D. Leonard, W. Z. Thomas, F. F. Young, N. A. Seymore, W. M. Bell were appointed to write History of Indiana Baptist. All are gone but Rev. Young.

\$100 was appropriated for annuals in 1923. Booster Squadrons had a great place as also a State Missionary W. Z. Thomas. Baptist Mission Gleaner "great".

We miss our press so much, Dr. J. I. Saunders-Founder and Dr. E. P. Thomas-Printer, (minutes of 1938 information).

1924 Late Dr. W. Z. Thomas reported church organized in Kokomo, Rev. Hatcher was called as the pastor. This work was a success a church home built. Dr. Burris is the present pastor who has greatly improved things.

## Current History

The year 1939 marked somewhat of a beginning of an era among Baptist in Indiana. The dawn of World War II, America's entrance into adventures in integration, better training for Ministers, Church radio and the New spirit of Revival in the churches made the forties and the fifties glorious years in which to live.

In the fall of this year the All Baptist Fellowship was born in the live and fertile brain of Rev. J. T. Highbaugh, pastor of Good Samaritan Baptist Church and Rev. Clive McGuire, Executive Secretary of the Indianapolis Baptist Association. Two Christian Community Centers came as result of this adventure. West Side Baptist Center opened in fall of 1942, with Mrs. Mattie D. G. Anderson, Director, returning from American Baptist Center in Detroit, Michigan and in 1943 Mrs. Anna Bybee of the Good Samaritan Baptist Church continuing untill 1953 with an average daily attendance of 46 children daily. The Eastside Christian Center now known as the Eastside Christian Center was begun in 1945 in the New Bethel Baptist Annex 1523 Martindale Ave. Rev. G. Baltimore, pastor. In 1947 it moved to its present location 1937 N. Arsenal Ave., Mrs. Edna M. Martin pioneered this field being its first Director growing it from a handful of children to 215 daily 7 full time workers and 13 part time workers and an operative Budget of \$20,000 annually. The Board of Directors as originally dreamed of by Drs. McGuire and Highbaugh has representatives on it from all major Baptist Conventions, white and Negro and serves adults, Young People, Teenagers and Children, Day Nursery and Recreational projects touching all races. Rev. D. C. Venerable became president in 1947 succeeding Rev. Highbaugh. Rev. F. F. Young remained treasurer until 1948, later Rev. L. C. Trent of Woodruff Place Bootist Church, Rev. Floyd Smith of Emmanuel Baptist Church and Rev. U. S. Clutton of Tuxedo Park Baptist Church and Rev. Wm. O. Breedlove of Calvary Baptist Church.

As formerly stated Central District Association began in 1916 on recommendation of Moderator Rev. R. D. Leonard First Moderator, Rev. F. F. Young 1916-1921; Rev. N. A. Seymore, 1921-1926; Rev. J. T. Highbaugh 1926-1940; Rev. C. J. Dailey 1940-1957. Rev. Dailey dreamed of a Baptist Seminary fostered by Baptist in Indianapolis. In 1943 this dream came true in the opening of the school in the fall of 1943 with 12 students, Rev. C. J. Dailey, Moderator; Rev. V. W. McLawler, D.

D., first Dean, 1945-1949; Dr. J. C. Carroll, D. D., 1949-1954; Rev. C. J. Dailey, 1954-1957; Rev. F. B. Davis, present Dean enrollment 86 students, 9 faithful instructors. In 1942 began religious broadcasting among us. Rev. J. B. Carter, pastor of 25th Street Baptist Church was our faithful pioneer in this field. Rev. Carter visited men and women of every walk of life, fostering that radio service. For years the Rev. J. T. Highbaugh was his associate Minister and kept the broadcast alive until his death in 1956.

In 1942 Rev. C. Henry Bell became Moderator of the Indiana Baptist Association in Antioch Baptist Church, Muncie, Indiana. His first major achievement was the paying off the Baptist Headquarters on Capitol Ave. The incorporation of the Association and the Survey of the State Mission Field. It was discovered there were 61,387 church members, 34,898 in the Indiana Baptist Association, 71 churches, 156 ordained Preachers, 13 Rural Churches (supported by farming) 24 village churches and 39 in cities, 21 of these churches and communities were rated as churches needing the regular aid of the Association. This survey was directed by Rev. J. T. Highbaugh, Rev. H. A. King, Rev. W. E. Starks, Rev. C. C. Cornell, G. W. Evans, F. W. Weather and Rev. F. F. Young and Mrs. Addie Sneed. Also the Budget plan of work was reorganized.

In 1950 Mrs. E. J. K. Hines went to her heavenly home and Mrs. Anna Washington became president of the Women's Home and Foreign Mission Convention. She had served as First Vice-President since 1913 and First Vice-President of the National Women's Convention since 1915. Rev. J. T. Weeden served as Corresponding Secretary until he was called to the St. Timothy Baptist Church, Cleveland, Ohio. Rev. J. W. Carr was corresponding Secretary.

In 1949 Rev. J. T. Highbaugh left the Good Samaritan Baptist Church and for two years worked with the Home Mission board of the American Baptist Convention and from 1952-1956 Home Mission Work in San Antonio, Texas, building a church in the very heart of a Five million dollar Housing Project for Negroes and was recalled to the Good Saramitan Baptist Church in 1956 a fire destroyed the church on January 19, 1957 and they are on their way back in a new location.

Tragedy also hit the Eastside in 1954 destroytist Church then pastored by Rev. Davis in the first year of his pastorate. But out of the ashes is rising a \$200,000 temple commensurate to the vision and courage of Rev. Davis and New Bethel.

Because of ill health of Rev. Bell his first Vice-Moderator was elected in the 98th year of the Association history. Our Centennial Celebration shall be a Mammouth Thanksgiving Parade both for the achievements of these 100 years and a Piszah Peep into the Second Century with our Great Joshua, Rev. H. T. Toliver of the Mt. Olive Baptist Church.

And it shall be held in the historic First Baptist Church, North Indianapolis, 50 years pastored by that Prince of Preachers, Rev. F. F. Young.

So with the poet we sing;

Through many dangers
Toils and snares
We have already come
Was Grace that brought us
Safe thus far and
Grace shall lead us on.



They met on Tuesday evening, up-stairs in the Wardock Hall on East Main between Fourth and Fifth Streets.



For over 14 years he pastored the historic Second Baptist Church of Anderson, Ind., serving this church longer than any other pastor in its long history. Rev. Crawley also had the distinction of serving for 12 years as chairman of the State Educational Board. At present he is the Field Worker for our State Association. Rev. J. H.
