# Moving to A Higher Ground A Narrative History of Mt. Zion Baptist Church by William F. Sims, Church Historian

In 1869, African-Americans who lived in Fletcher Bottom about eight miles southwest of Indianapolis usually worshiped at the White Lick Colored Baptist Church near Bridgeport or at the Lick Creek Baptist Church near Beech Grove. Sometimes during the year, seven or eights persons who represented the two congregations met on Fletcher's Farm to organize a new church. It is not know whether this group were ex-slaves of freed men, but most of them apparently lived on Fletcher's Farm. It had been only seven years since the signing of the Emancipation Proclamation in 1862 and the passage of the Civil Rights Act of 1866 that conferred citizenship upon Black Americans.

It is believed that founding group included Armma McCrackman, a charter member and perhaps Lucy Woodridge who was 104 years old when she died in 1925. Ramsey Dirks an original member was probably just a child in 1869, but he remembered the first meeting place of this new congregation. Hobart Banks was a boy in the early 1900s when he recall this story told by Ramsey Dirks. Mr. Banks who died in 1996 at 98 years old had been a member for 85 years. Mr. Dirks shared that the owner of Pletcher's Farm donated an old abandon tool shed to the members of the new congregation. He remembered watching the men of Pletcher's Farm ploking up that old tool shed and miraculously carrying it from lowland up a hill to higher ground. There they reset the tool shed and added on to it. Because it was set on a hill, they called this new church Mt. Zion. As Hobart Banks retold this story there were sparkles in his eyes. He stated that he read that Mt. Zion meant "higher ground". And since that day in Fletcher's Bottom, Mt. Zion has been on the move to higher ground.

From its humble beginning until the present, Mt. Zion has always sought to live up to its mame. The congregation's determination to do the will of God is evident in its progress during the past 130 years. Mt. Zion has truly been a people of faith. Its mission has been indeed been a move toward higher ground. From an abandon tool shed on Fletcher's Farm to a house on Railroad and Second St.; to its first edifice at that location (1872 – 1907). From its second edifice at 12th and Fayerte Street(1908-1906) to a magnificant limestone cathedral at 35th Street, Boulevard Place and Graceland Avenue(1960 – present).

Since its Founding in 1869, twenty pastors(includes interim pastors) have served Mt. Zion. Mt. Zion 's pastors have come from various backgrounds. Its pastors included persons who have held offices in the National Baptist Convention, USA, Inc., Progressive National Baptist Convention, Inc Indiana General Missionary Baptist Convention and the Martin Luther Kine, Ir Memorial State Convention. Mt. Zion through the years has been a trailblazer and a Spiritual leader in the Indianapolis community. Mt. Zion was one of the first African-American congregation to join the Church Federation of Indianapolis and the Indianapolis Baptist Association(American Baptist Churches). Mt. Zion has been leader in the development of a daycare center, senior citizen housing, healthcare center and the organization of the first black church sonosored federal credit union in Indiana.

Mt. Zion has been a leader in community outreach, Christian Education, Youth Ministry and worship. Its worship has included sound biblical preaching enhanced by good church music. The music ministry has been inclusive of anthems, gospel, Negro spirituals, choral selections and hymns of faith. In aditional to its various vocal choirs, there is also a Handhell choir.

The membership of Mt. Zion has over the years has been predominently Africanhamerican, but during the eighties six to eight members were caucasian. Through the years the Mt. Zion family has included persons from many professions and walks to life. During the 45-year pastorate of Dr. R. T. Andrews, Sr. (1939-1984) there was a heavy concentration of educators and profesional persons inclusive of laborers, business persons, teachers, principals, and government personnel. The membership of the church has seen decline and growith over the years. From its eight founding members to a membership of 150 in 1880; o 350 between 1833 - 1880; to 500 in 1907.

In 1907 the membership dropped to 190, but by 1921 increased to 1050 under the leadership of Rev. G. W. Ward... According to historical data, high membership of 1150 was reached during the Andrews years. Since 1984 church membership has declined from 800 to 550 persons.

Since the demise of Mr. Zion's longest pastorate, R. T. Andrews in 1984, four pastors have served the congregation, Rev. James W. Robinson was interim pastor 1987-1988, Dr. Joseph H. Finnell was pastor from 1988 until his untimesly death in February 1997. Dr. M. Samuel Pinkston served as interim pastor, 1997 - 1998. The current pastor, Dr. Philip Karl James was called from the Beautiful Plain Baptist Church of Binghamton, New York came to serve as Mt. Zion's 20th pastor.

So the faith journey continues, a people prepares to move to even higher ground. Looking toward the God of our fathers, and remembering the God of our heritage, Mt. Zion is setting new goals for the future. We shall not forget our humble beginning, but we will build on the foundations of our ancestors as we embrace the new millennium and continue the journey to Higher Ground.

The Mt. Zion Gospel Choir was organized by the late, great Dr. R. T. Andrews, Sr., Pastor of Mt. Zion Baptist Church.

The Church had been without a "Gospel Choir" for some time. It was the feeling of the Pastor and other members of the congregation, that a "Gospel Choir" would enhance and increase the night service attendance rate.

Our first director was Roosevelt Squires and he really started the choir out on a good firm foundation. After Mr. Squires became ill and could no longer be with us, we experienced "up and down" periods, but with our perservation and the help and encouragement of our pastor, we managed to stay together. One thought that was left with us by Mr. Squires was to: "Never disband; just keep meeting, through good times and bad." We almost died so many times that Rev. Andrews gave us the nick name of "HIS CART CHOIR"
