Becoming active at an early age, Mrs. Young made history by becoming the first female to be granted a scholarship from the church. In 1935, she graduated from Lewis Business College. On April 11, 1937, she began fifty-two years of holy matrimony with the late Mr. John Julius Young, the son of Rev., F.F. Young.

The life of Mrs. Young is characterized not only by a rich history, but also by years of devode service in numerous ministries. For 68 years, she has humbly served on the Usher Board. She rendered 16 years in the capacity of church clerk. A former Sunday School teacher, she can still be found every Sunday in the F.F. Young Sunday School class. In addition, she serves as the financial secretary for the Capitol City for over 20 years. Many remember the outstanding leadership that she provided as the Chairperson for the 100th Church Anniversary.
