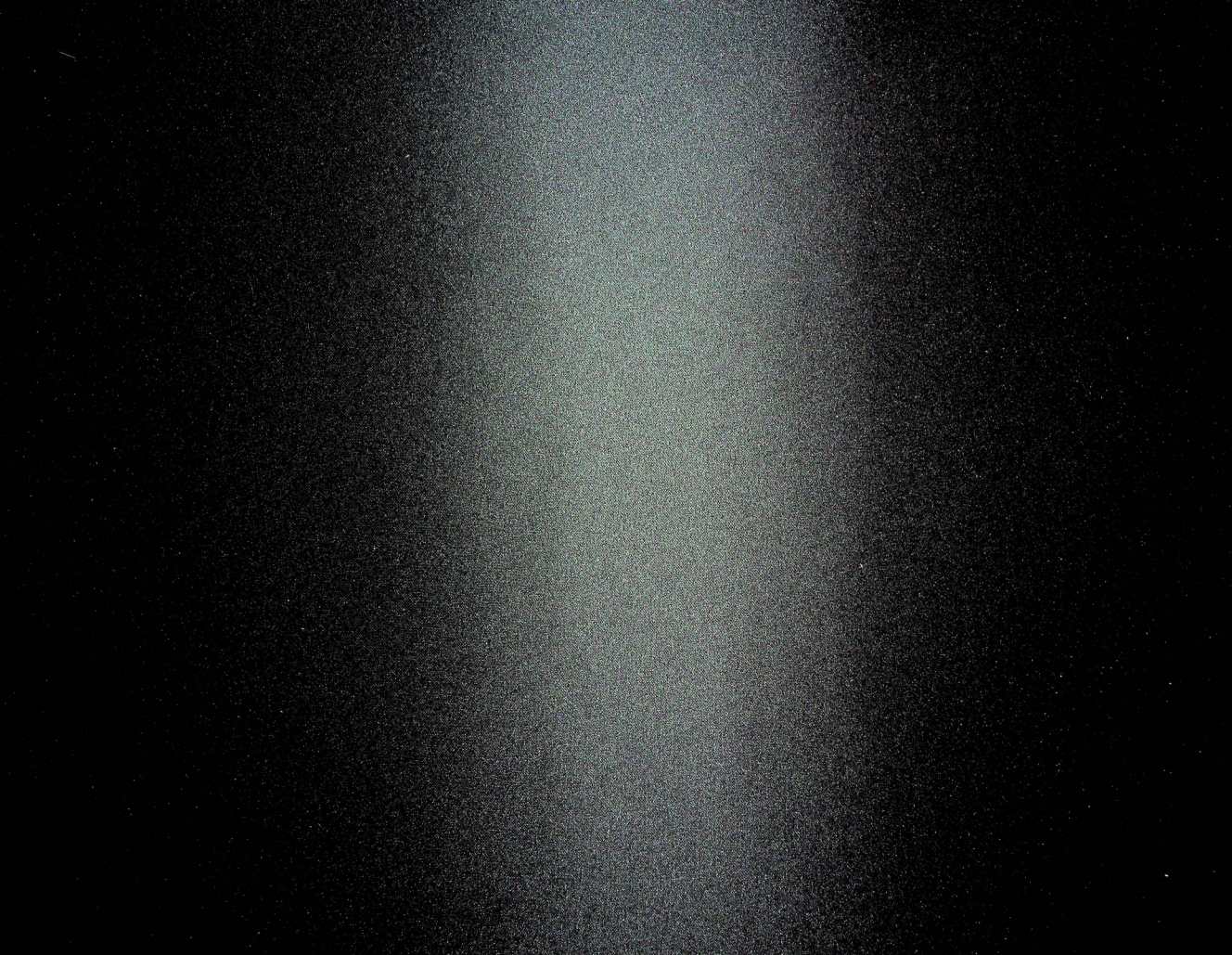

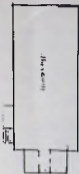

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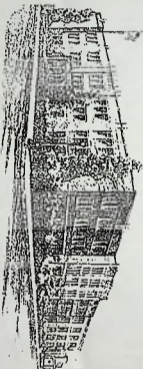

THE CENTER CONCEPT

The Crispus Attucks Center will be an extension to the classroom teaching experience and will interface with the African-American Curriculum now taught from kindergarten through the twelfth grade. As an educational facility, it will utilize some of the most effective techniques in teaching the importance of the African-American experience through accurate documentation of history, traditions, cultures, and values.

The Center will also recognize, honor and celebrate outstanding contributions of African-Americans and specifically those who have had an association with Crispus Attucks High School.

The Center will also provide the Indianapolis Community with a permanent site for housing African-American artifacts with emphasis on those pertaining to Crispus Attucks High School.

The (John Morton-Finney) Resource Room

The (John Morton-Finney) Resource Room will provide an opportunity for in-depth research by teachers, academic scholars and community education. The Resource Room will house literature, posters, board games, slides, videos, films and archival material. It also will make available original items of material pertaining to Crispus Attucks. This room will offer additional information on exhibits found in the museum.


Dear Crispus Attucks Classmate of 1945:
